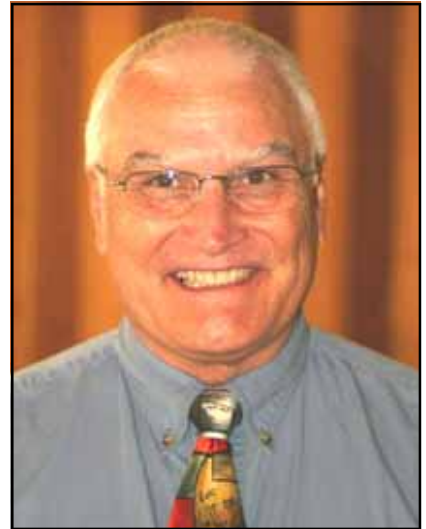




Ten Truths to a "Human's" Life

Some time ago there was an article in *Homiletics* magazine about pet therapy dogs and the wonderful ministry that they provide for some 350,000 patients in the United States. In keeping with our mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, I thought the 10 truths about dogs included in the article could aptly be renamed *Everything I Need to Know about Discipleship I Learned from My Dog* (with apologies to Robert Fulghum).

Enjoy:

1. Greet loved ones with wagging tail. Nothing is more important than feeling loved, and there's no creature on the planet that does it better than a dog. The wagging tail affirms that this is where we belong: This is our home, where we live, where we're safe and where we're loved.
2. Eat with gusto and enthusiasm. You know how dogs eat: slobber flying everywhere, and licking the dish clean until every last scent of gravy is gone. Dogs know that eating is a celebration of life. Breaking bread together is holy. To nourish the body is not a chore, but a sacrament. Animositities are dissipated at meals, barriers broken down, friendships renewed and strengthened. So, eat with gusto. Enjoy all the flavors and spices of creation.
3. On hot days, drink lots of water and lie under a shady tree. Relax, slow down and enjoy. Give yourself a time out. Opt out, unplug, and get lazy.
4. Run, romp and play daily. Physical exercise is as important for the soul as it is for the body. No disciple of Christ can be as faithful and effective when the body is run down and health is unnecessarily poor. When we learn how to play and stretch and get in some exercise we'll feel better from the inside out.
5. Be loyal. Loyalty is a good thing, and if your dog is nothing else, he is loyal to a fault. Loyalty has fallen on hard times. Loyalty is a critical element of discipleship, for it speaks to our relationship with others: our spouse, our

6. When you're happy, dance around and wag your tail. Thankfulness and celebration are powerful dynamics for successful and healthy living. Gratitude is a gift we give ourselves that enables us to affirm the essential goodness of life. Even when adversity strikes, gratitude helps us maintain our perspective and carries us through the low moments.
 7. If someone is having a bad day, be silent, sit close by and nuzzle gently. We all have bad days. That's why we need encouragement and affirmation. When we are depressed, we know that it takes only a quiet word, a gentle touch to bring us around. A dog has this instinct that tells it when to be dancing and jumping around and when to just be there beside you. Words are not always needed, or even helpful, to convey empathy. A gentle nuzzle will do.
 8. No matter how harshly you're scolded, don't pout – run back and make friends. Carrying grudges makes life a drudgery. Make friends and keep them. Overlook faults and assume the best. Don't keep a scorecard of rights and wrongs. Don't take offense.
 9. Avoid biting when a simple growl will do. We do not need to injure others by what we say or do. We can be strong with love; firm with kindness.
 10. Bark with your buddies. Barking is an act of commonality. Barking says we belong in this together. We are one.

God put dogs on earth to remind us of some important truths, for on one level dogs seem to do better at displaying human traits than humans. And much more Christ-like. Think about it. Consistently more humble, more loving, more grateful, more joyful, more kindhearted, and so on. Which should compel us to vow – if not to bow wow: I will never let my dog be a better Christian than myself.

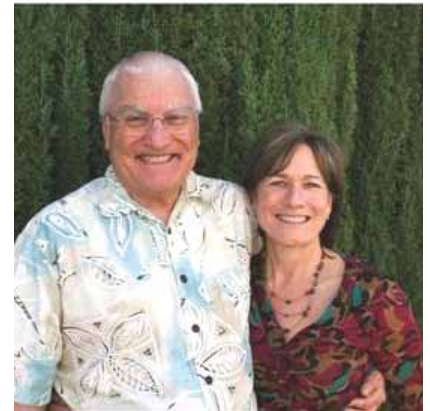
While arrangements are still being made, desserts will be served after each worship service. Please check your Sunday worship bulletin for details regarding room number information of the celebration.

Rev. Dr. Candace Lansberry has been serving as the North District Superintendent appointed by the Desert Southwest Annual Conference.

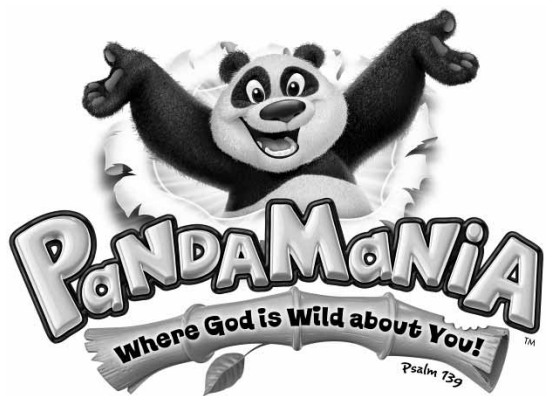

Brothers and Sisters of the Desert Southwest Conference,

In February 2012, lay and clergy members of the Desert Southwest Conference will have the exciting opportunity to be part of a mission team that will travel to Africa University. Africa University is an institution of higher education that was founded by The United Methodist Church in March 1992. It is the first private university chartered in the country of Zimbabwe and serves the entire continent of Africa.

This mission trip will be the culmination of the Conference's \$500,000 commitment to Africa University to endow the Joel Huffman Chair of Health Sciences. This Chair will help prepare persons to provide health services especially in rural African areas where the killer diseases of HIV/AIDS and malaria most often go untreated.

Joel Huffman was the first treasurer and administrative officer of the Desert Southwest Conference. Scheduled for February 19-27, 2012, this mission trip will give us the opportunity to participate in the dedication of the Chair of Health Sciences named in Joel's honor. It will also enable us to engage in mission work at Africa University and the United Methodist Old Mutare Mission, as well as see the beauty of Africa including Victoria Falls.

Africa University is located just outside of Zimbabwe's fourth largest city, Mutare, which is in the Eastern Highlands area of Zimbabwe. The campus, of red brick buildings under tile, is nestled in the Nyagambu River Valley, across the road from the Old Mutare UMC Mission which was established in 1897. Additional information about Africa University and the Mutare area in which it is located can be found on the Africa University website at www.africau.edu.

Total individual costs for this trip are being estimated in the neighborhood of \$4,500. Local churches, United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and others are encouraged to help raise funds to provide scholarships for those who are unable to participate in this mission opportunity without the help of others.

Additional information will be presented at the 2011 session of The Desert Southwest Annual Conference at the end of June. In the meantime, please save these dates for this exciting travel to Zimbabwe. It will be amazing to be in mission together at Africa University and Old Mutare! We hope you will plan to join us.

Centennial NJROTC Part of Trinity "Family"

While you won't recognize all the hard working teen-agers volunteering at Trinity UMC events, it was these youth who excelled during the past school year in the Naval Junior Officer Training Corps under Gail Johnson at Centennial High School.

The youth who volunteered at Trinity events were the same youth who were recognized for academics, leadership and athleticism in competition against other NJROTC high schools throughout the nation.

Thanks in part to Gail Johnson, U.S. Navy-Retired, and her family who have been a strong supporter of the Trinity UMC family. Her cadet "family" reached 270 in numbers at Centennial High during the 2010-2011 school year, making the high school one of the third largest NJROTC programs in the country.

Perhaps the most shining moment came in April when Centennial finished third overall in the nation out of 650 Navy JROTC units at the National Drill, Physical Fitness and Academics Championships at the Naval Air Station Pensacola, Pensacola, Fla.

The school finished third in unit personnel inspection, third in athletics, fifth in academics, fourth in push-ups (8 boys, 8 girls team), fourth in the 220 relay (4 boys/4 girls team), third in armed exhibition drill and fifth in armed regulation drill.

Among the individual winners, Cadet Ragen Johnson, who will be entering her sophomore year in August with instructor and proud mother Gail Johnson, finished seventh in the girls division with a total of 79 pushups.

Locally, the Centennial cadets finished first in the Nevada State All Navy Academic, Drill, and Field Competition and in first place in the Clark County District Meet Joint Competition during the past school year.

While Gail is proud of her daughter Ragen, she has to be proud of how far the Centennial program has grown over the years. The NJROTC staff also supports these cadets after high school and has helped seven grads be accepted into the U.S. Naval Academy and U.S. Air Force Academy.

Don't be surprised to see some of these same fresh faces at upcoming Trinity events during the coming year. Each cadet performs 48 hours of community service.

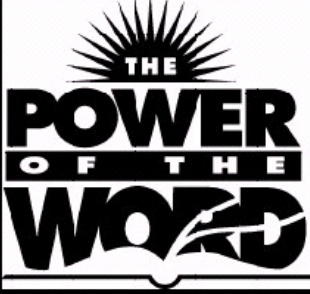
